The NCSU Libraries Makerspace program helped Jazsalyn McNeil '16 fuse art and design within the emerging fields of wearable tech-

nologies and interactive electronic textiles with her *Pulse Dress*. McNeil, a "fusion designer" in Dr. Jesse Jur's Nano-EXTended Textiles (NEXT) Research Group, worked with the concept of printed biometric sensors to illuminate a cascade of LED lights integrated with the fabric. The dress, with interactive biosensor, will literally "let you see your heart beat."






